She is married and has one son. She is currently a non-traditional college student. She is fluent in two Kurdish dialects, Farsi, Arabic and English.

Jasenka Besic is Bosnian, and lived in Bosnia and Germany prior to coming to the United States when she was nine years old. She is a senior in high school, where she is an honors student. She is a student leader in peer mentoring, and she is a recent recipient of the President's Volunteer Service Award and Atlanta's Campfire Embers Award. She is fluent in Bosnian, German, and English.Our program is being facilitated by our member Susan Pavlin, who directs program design and development for RFS. Susan's special interests are theater, video and film in addition to her eager participation in global and local community.



#### Scholarships Awarded to 14 Women

The Atlanta Branch has awarded scholarships to fourteen outstanding women who attend colleges and universities in the Metro Atlanta area. Each one received \$500.00, designated as supplemental funds to be used for textbooks, childcare or transportation. The Scholarship Committee took into consideration each applicant's grades. the rigor of their course of study, their family situation and any unique characteristics. Money to fund this scholarship program as well as other philanthropies that support women and education is raised by the AAUW Annual Bookfair. The recipients are all over the age of 30, iuniors or seniors and particularly deserving of support in their pursuit of education. They all have excellent grades (7 of them have a 3.7 GPA or better) and more than half have children at home. Two of the recipients are parents of twins. One is caring for elderly parents. Most

#### PRESIDENT'S CORNER



### It Is Time To Sign Up for Our Bookfair!

Our 47<sup>th</sup> Annual Bookfair has moved to Perimeter Mall due to construction at Lenox Square.

Volunteering a few hours of your time (4 shifts = 12 hours) can make a big difference in how we operate.

Some volunteers traditionally spend 24 or more hours at Bookfair while a few core workers spend more than

70 hours of their week at the Mall. This is a huge burden on these members! Many of our members are not volunteering, or are not volunteering enough hours. Bookfair grosses about \$10 per volunteer hour. A \$60 donation to Local Scholarships,

Community Action Grants or Educational Fund equals two Bookfair shifts. If you believe in the principles that guide our services/ scholarships/ fellowships for women funded with Bookfair money, then show your support.
