

### 54th AAUW Bookfair Faces Challenges

The 54th AAUW Bookfair will face new challenges this year.

Our space in Perimeter Mall has been severely cut back. We will only be allowed to set up our sale in the Dillard's wing of the Mall! There are no empty stores in Perimeter Mall (good news for the economy ...bad news for Book Fair), and the escalators near the Food Court are under renovation further reducing our display areas. This means that we will need more merchandisers who can be extremely diligent in constantly restocking our limited display tables and bookcases. The shift schedule has added 15 minutes to the first and last shifts to provide additional restocking and clean up time this year. Since we may be restricted to only 2 cashier tables due to limited space, we will need more cashier assistants to tally books for customers in line or away from crowded areas. The Bookfair Steering Committee is looking at ways we can make the best of this difficult situation.

### New this year

Because we have a smaller floor plan, we should be able to finish our set-up earlier. For that reason, opening night has been moved to Monday night. This will give us an additional sale day to try to recoup decreased book sales caused by lack of display space. This plan requires that we have enough volunteers working energetically and efficiently to complete set up in one day, rather than the two days we normally spend getting the job done.

Can You Suggest a New Source for Volunteers? Bookfair needs help! We could use extra volunteers any time during Bookfair week, September 22 through 29, but we particularly need help with Set-Up and/ or Tear-Down on both Sunday evenings. A student club, youth group at your church, or any organization that does community service projects would be likely candidates.

Much of our volunteer work requires heavy lifting and physical stamina. If you know of any group of energetic volunteers who can help us, please contact Barbara Buchanan.

Remember, additional volunteers mean added time credited to our Branch's portion of the profits of Bookfair. More volunteer hours equal more funds for our Branch to distribute.

Despite our logistical challenges this year we must not lose sight of this fact: Financial support of our local scholarships, national fellowships/grants and local community action grants would be impossible without a large fundraiser like our Bookfair. We need your help.

If we all share the work, the work will be lighter for everyone.

### NCCWSL Conference Makes An Impression

Atlanta Branch sponsored three students to attend the 2013 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) this past June: Janelle Wajsen from Savannah College of Art and Design, Lydia Dailey from Atlanta Metropolitan State College, and Jasmine Harrison from Clark Atlanta University.

Janelle Wajsen attended a workshop relating to mentoring and peer mentoring. She felt that from NCCWSL 2013 she learned many lessons to help her focus on where she is most needed in society. Janelle stated, "Over the course of the conference I was inspired by the number of women who wanted to improve the current situation not just for woman but for the good of society. But one thing I did notice was that no one mentioned anything about how we "women" rear the next generation to continue growing our society and teaching our children our culture. This I believe is a crucial part in changing from generation to generation. In many ways reaching this sector of society could be the ultimate ticket in changing the minds of our next generation. By teaching our children to treat each other respectfully. inevitably, one day when they become CEOs or Executives and hire employees, they would treat everyone fairly because that is how they were raised."

Lydia Dailey gained information from attending self-defense, meditation and belly dancing, and a racial and gender discrimination of African American women workshop. Lydia enjoyed being active. From the self-defense workshop, she learned techniques to protect herself and the belly dancing and meditation got her blood flowing. In the racial and gender discrimination class, she learned about difficulties facing African American women in the workplace. Lydia said, "It's about knowing your rights and finding ways to alleviate racial barriers." Jasmine Harrison enjoyed NCCWSL as well. She is majoring in Criminal Justice and working as an intern for the Atlanta Police Department.

The Atlanta Branch's work at Bookfair has allowed our branch to send students from our College/University partners to attend the NCCWSL conference. By supporting these young women in acquiring crucial skills, we are all planning for and nurturing the future.

All three attendees appreciated the opportunity to attend the conference and thanked Atlanta Branch for their support. Lydia called the conference "one to remember". We look forward to hearing about their experiences when we meet them in September.

### An Interview with Dr. Blondie Chitunya-Wilson

Congratulations Atlanta Branch member Blondie Chitunya-Wilson for her recent graduation from Fielding Graduate University, Santa Barbara, California. Blondie received her doctorate degree in Media Psychology. I spoke with Blondie to learn more about her recent achievement.

### What was the topic of your dissertation?

The impact of Cosmetic Surgery Reality Television show viewing and American women's desire for cosmetic surgery.

### What got you interested in Media psychology, and lead you to pursue a Ph.D. in it?

When I left Zimbabwe for the U.S., my goal was to pursue a Ph.D. in Mass Communications. While completing my Master's degree program at the American InterContinental University, one of my professors advised me to consider a Ph.D. in Media Psychology. Since my educational background is in Mass Media Arts, I decided to pursue a Ph.D. in Media Psychology to better understand human behavior in relation to traditional and emerging media.


### How would you like to use your degree in the future?

Media Psychology is an emerging discipline and is also multidisciplinary. I can use my doctoral degree in many different ways including doing research in such areas as social justice, consulting, teaching, counseling, and leadership training. I believe it is important to have a vision of what your ideal world would look like, if given the opportunity to get there. I have not lost my dream for women's equality, and promoting a socially just society. I firmly believe that the media has a tremendous impact on human behavior and human choices. My strong values and belief that all people, despite their religious, ethnic, sexual or gender orientation, should have equal opportunities is what motivates and drives me to use my experience and skills to further social justice.

### 4. Has your involvement with AAUW influenced graduate work and you as a person?
