AAUW National awarded three grants from AAUW Funds in the metro Atlanta area in 2014. The Global Village Project, under the direction of Amy Pelissero, received a Community Action Grant for their Intensive Literacy Program for Teenage Young Women. Located in Decatur, the Global Village Project is an innovative school for young refugee women in the Atlanta area. Their intensive literacy program ensures that these students acquire the necessary skills to become successful speakers, readers, and writers. The program is designed to meet the needs of young women with limited literacy and education, and it allows them to share the knowledge they gain with others.

Tiffany Willis, an M.B.A. from Emory University, received a Career Development Grant. Tiffany Willis' work on empowering at-risk youth, specifically girls, has continued to evolve since her reign as Ms.

Black Georgia USA. She has become a familiar face in various community outlets for young women. Her recent efforts have secured financial assistance to fund a summer youth hot food program for a local church. Her endless passion for helping others has inspired her to serve as a mentor in the professional arena.

Antonia Burroughs, who holds a Certificate in Computer Sciences from the University of California, Los Angeles, also received a Career Development Grant. Ms. Burroughs is an award-winning user interface, user experience, and front-end web designer and developer. She has worked with AT&T, Cornerstone Media Group, United Way of Metropolitan Atlanta and Elsevier/MCStrategies. Her work includes turning creative projects into real products.
