President's Message

Happy Thanksgiving to everyone! I hope all of you have an opportunity to celebrate with family and friends. The holidays are a time for favorite recipes full of calories with not so healthy ingredients that can have a negative impact our health status. Choose your food wisely. In addition, our routines are sometimes altered as we travel and visit. Think about maintaining your walking and exercise routines to so your health does not suffer.

A member recently shared an article from a local newsletter about Atlanta's suffragists. After reading this article, I thought about the women that paved the way for women today and how we need to acknowledge their contributions to accomplish women's rights. Two women that come to mind are Eleanor Raoul and Eleanor Roosevelt.

In November of 1915, the women in Atlanta's suffragist group were determined and energetic, although they faced opposition from the male politicians who ran the state. The various suffragist organizations planned and executed one of Georgia's grandest suffrage marches on Tuesday, November 16, 2015. Miss Eleanor Raoul led the march on a prancing white horse with 500 local and state suffragists gathered at the intersection of Peachtree and Ponce de Leon joining on foot, horse, cars or on floats. One of the final features of the parade was a little boy driving a donkey cart with a banner declaring "Georgia Catching Up." The women were promised police and fireman to help lead the parade and protect the women, but the promise was not fulfilled. The women encountered cars, cabs and wagons rushing into participants. Life was not easy for Georgia's suffragists' but most lived to see the triumph of their cause a few years later. Miss Eleanor Raoul went on to found the Atlanta Chapter of the League of Women Voters. Miss Raoul graduated from Emory Law School and in 2014 and had an Emory dorm named in her honor.

Eleanor Roosevelt, who died in November 1962, was an American politician, diplomat, and activist. She was the longest-serving First Lady of the Unites States. Eleanor had an unhappy childhood, losing both parents and a brother at an early age. At 15, she attended Allenwood Academy in London, where she was deeply influenced by its feminist headmistress Marie Souvestre. Upon returning to the United States, she married her fifth cousin, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, in 1905. Franklin's controlling mother and Franklin's affair with Lucy Mercer complicated the marriage. Eleanor resolved to seek fulfillment in a public life of her own. She campaigned, made public appearances and gave speeches on behalf of her husband. She advocated for expanded roles for women in the workplace, the civil rights of African and Asian Americans. She remained active in politics following her husband's death. In 1999, she was ranked ninth in Gallup's List of the Most Widely Admired People of the 20th Century.

Eleanor Roosevelt visited AAUW branches and spoke to AAUW gatherings. She did not attend college but was awarded many honorary degrees. Membership to AAUW is open to women who receive an honorary degree from an approved college, and she joined AAUW in 1929.

Many more women worked to obtain the right to vote for women and other rights that we enjoy today. As we celebrate with friends and family in this season on Thanksgiving, let us not forget those women who preceded us in the movement to promote expanding roles and rights for women.

The results are in! For the 56th year in a row our Bookfair was a community and fundraising success. We overcame the challenge of the move to a new location at North Point where we were followed by many loyal long time buyers and met quite a few new ones. Overall net income from the sale was down from recent years, but the Atlanta Branch's percentage of the work hours and income was up, and our Internet sales continue to grow.

Atlanta members and friends contributed 67% of the tallied hours, up 5% over our percentage in 2014! The final result of all of our hard work, throughout the year and at the sale, is the distribution of \$28,159 to our Branch's Community Fund. General Growth Properties, the company that owns both Perimeter and North Point Malls, expressed their enthusiasm at hosting us again next year. Early next year, they will assess the status of the Perimeter remodeling and let us know our options for Bookfair 2016.
