# To Be Or Not To Be?


## We Need Your Input!

#### Dear Sister Atlanta AAUW Members:

As you ponder the message from our co-Presidents above and as you consider your responses to the questions raised, I want to add this as Public Policy Chair and current President-Elect. Life happens. I say this because life has happened to my husband, Stan, and me. Not something terrible, but this summer we determined that our season in Atlanta has come to an end. We are moving to Washington, D.C., in September for family reasons. As you can see, this leaves Atlanta AAUW without a Public Policy Chair and without a President-Elect. You should note that I agreed to be President-Elect when absolutely no one else had agreed to take it. The fact that we are having trouble getting officers does not bode well for the longevity of our wonderful organization. But perhaps its season, too, has come to an end. Only y'all can decide. In the meantime, let me speak to the urgent public policy needs of the day.

Look at your handbook and see the AAUW Public Policy priorities. We are in a time of crisis in this country. Education is under attack. History is under attack. Our own CDC was hit with over 500 rounds of ammunition in the recent attack which occurred near a daycare center and which killed a young police officer. Even if Atlanta AAUW disappears, your voice does not. Find your passion on one of these issues. Volunteer with the ACLU, protest, make phone calls, write your congressional and local representatives. For every email or call they receive, they assume 40 other people feel as you do who have not written or called. Donate to the causes you believe in if you have some extra pennies. We cannot let our democracy die on the eve of its 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Stand strong. I'll be thinking of you from the streets of D.C.

I am an older (often referred to as "senior") white female. In today's world, I feel seen and respected. Then I remember a time back in the early 70's. I was in a study group at my church, and I raised a question about an important committee being all-male (remember Gloria Steinem?). I was told that we could speak through our husbands. I fumed, but I was silent. Across the board we women were in the minority—not in numbers, but in representation.

Then, after fuming done by lots of women and even some men, came change.

Currently the self-identification of some groups of people are no longer being recognized. Think especially of the transgender person who is told there is no such thing—except, of course, when they <u>are</u> identified as transgender and rights are taken away. Think of people of color who worry about their security (and their children's) not from robbery or assault, but by our government. Think of people of faiths that are not Christian. They are concerned not only about their own safety but also the security of their places of worship. Because I'm older, I get all sorts of special benefits. I've been receiving social security and medicare for almost twenty-five years. Of course, I paid in! But—do the math! So often when buying tickets to all sorts of places, there's a special price for me. We women and we seniors have gained respect, esteem, and lots of perks. It didn't just happen. We had to work for it.

Now it's time for us to work again so that others who self-identify differently receive the same! It's time to speak up and speak out. That's what equity and justice are all about!

# Summer Bookfair Update



This spring, AAUW received a large donation of cookbooks from the Atlanta History Center.

On June 21, we held a one-day sidewalk sale at Westside Market with these and other books and made \$1,000. Earlier in June, independent book dealer Zeliha Karakus visited us in the bookroom and purchased \$581 from our "dealer shelves." Bookroom volunteers have focused on cleaning and decluttering our workspace at Habersham Estate Condominiums. A dozen surplus 8-foot tables have been donated to recreation centers in Fulton and DeKalb Counties. Additionally, we gave away seven red bookcases to female entrepreneurs with businesses at Westside, Kim Arenas (pictured) and Tamara Grant. Some of us remember those bookcases as ones we used for paperback books at our annual mall sales. Donating surplus tables and bookcases gives the bookroom more space for books. We have two

more red bookcases to donate. Please contact me or call the bookroom if you know someone who might want them.






